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Executive Summary

This is the third and final annual report to the voters and educational community of the Centennial School District. It covers the work completed in the 2023 year and provides a final analysis and conclusion of the 2020 Bond.

The community-based Bond Oversight Committee (BOC) was appointed by Centennial School District's Board of Education to review fiscal and facility decisions and expenditures. The BOC was formed in the fall of 2020. Since its inception, volunteers have dedicated many hours to actively monitor the CSD 2020 Bond program and report to the Centennial community on its progress. The Committee shares its unwavering support for the District and its vision, where each and every student is seen, feels connected, valued, and supported. This is the BOC's final report. 


Overview of 2023 Activity

The BOC met three times during the 2023 school year to:

Bond Work in Progress

DISTRICT-WIDE

• EXTERIOR LIGHTING: All lighting is installed at CHS, CMS, OMS, Meadows, Parklane, Powell Butte, and Patrick Lynch. Minor clean up and removal of old PGE equipment is in progress.

CENTENNIAL HIGH SCHOOL

POOL VENTILATION: All work is complete and fully operational.
Minor balancing adjustments are in progress.

CENTENNIAL MIDDLE SCHOOL

 HEATING & 400/500 WING COOLING: All work is complete and fully operational. Minor balancing adjustments are in progress as well as updates to the remote interface.

PLEASANT VALLEY ELEMENTARY

 SITE STORM DRAINAGE (PHASE 2): All underground piping is in place and fully operational. Minor sod and concrete repairs will occur over Spring Break when weather allows.

POWELL BUTTE ELEMENTARY

• SEISMIC UPGRADES: Design is complete. CMGC bidding and GMP contracting will occur roughly 1/19/24 – 2/28/24. Construction activity will take place 6/15/24-10/1/24.

MULTI-SITE GYMNASIUMS ELEMENTARY

NOTE: While the gymnasiums have been used by staff and students since the start of the school year, there are ongoing issues with the general contractor to get all contract work completed. This is anticipated to run through March.

While certain projects saw costs below or above the initial pre-bond and early planning estimates, overall, all projects have been successfully completed within the overall Bond budget, leaving a proportionally small amount of funds remaining for the Bond close out process.

Analysis

The Bond Oversight Committee (BOC) is pleased to present its final analysis of Centennial's successful 2020 Bond. Our mandatory committee, appointed by the Centennial School District board upon approval of the citizen's passage of the \$65 Million 2020 Bond, worked together over three years. This analysis comprehensively overviews membership, 2020 Bond background, challenges and successes, 2020 Bond performance analysis, and more.

Membership

The BOC is a 15-member team composed of a six-person voting committee and a nine-member non-voting District leadership advisory team.

Over the past three years, the Bond Oversight Committee (BOC) met every three months and toured work sites across the District; gathered vital information about bond progress; asked unfiltered questions concerning bond work and schedules; and discussed additional work when unforeseen repairs and/or if deterioration was discovered upon routine demolition of planned work.

The BOC is a team and functions as such. Individually, we are not the BOC. Think in terms of what the BOC does as a whole, not what we individually want to get done. BOC members provided an extra layer of transparency and unbiased review of the 2020 Bond projects on behalf of the Centennial community to whom they would be accountable. BOC meetings are a free speech zone where anyone can ask questions because the process can only be transparent if we, as the community, can ask and have answered all our questions.

Analysis (Continued)

2020 Bond: Background & Challenges

After a facilities analysis, community input, and the work of a Long-Range Facilities Planning Committee, the District began its broad plan and quest to address high-priority school infrastructure improvements and needs across the District through a 2020 Bond proposition. This included critical repairs, safety and security improvements, an elementary-to-middle school conversion, and four new elementary school gymnasiums. The 2020 Bond proposition coincided with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and was successfully passed by the voters. Bonds were sold on the financial market.

As part of the 2020 Bond, upgrades occurred for every school within the District's boundaries. That being said, schools did not receive equal amounts, mainly because the ages (both younger and older) of the schools were different. Hence, deterioration and critical repairs for the older schools received priority attention. Another glaring need at four elementary schools was designated multi-use gym spaces to bring them up to par with other elementary schools with gyms. As mentioned in the bond description, an additional and more specific need was the conversion of Harold Oliver Elementary into a middle school to address balanced enrollment across the elementary and middle schools and provide more age-appropriate programming similar to surrounding districts. What may arguably be equal in needs/attention were roofing, security, asbestos mitigation, ventilation, lighting, high school track, middle school track & field areas, and rewiring for advances and innovation in technology.

Due to pandemic impacts, supply chains were adversely affected, so work schedules became a number one topic in many of the weekly BOC planning meetings. District leadership and R&C Management project manager Scott Rose, whose honesty, project knowledge, and industry relationships proved essential, kept Centennial projects on track to successful completion.



2020 Bond Performance & Grant Funded Projects

The District fulfilled the requirements of the bonding agency to complete or have money dedicated/bid for 85% of \$72,494,690 (\$65 Million Bond + \$7,494,690 state grant and other grants) within three years. As of this writing, the District has expended 100% usage of bond funds.

The District secured nearly \$7.5 million matching state grant plus approximately \$6.3 million in other grants (seismic grants and energy efficiency-related reimbursements garnered by the District and its management firm of R&C). Projects that are still in progress as of today are funded by the remaining grant dollars.

Due to the rigor of diligence by all the relevant parties, including the Centennial School Board, the planned 2020 Bond projects in total dollars came nearly \$4 million under budget. The District convened the BOC and a Long-Range Facilities Planning Committee to identify and address high-priority school infrastructure needs. As a result, the remaining bond funds were used for additional roofing repairs, Butler Creek boiler replacement, and security improvements at various schools.

Investing in Local Contractors

Another notable success of the BOC directives was the continuous conversation about bids for jobs vetted for the importance of tapping into local skilled work companies within a ten-mile radius of the District Office. At last count, 13.5% of the workforce cared for nearly 10 million dollars of work on our projects. The BOC is particularly proud of this accomplishment.

Conclusion



The BOC is the Centennial community, established to Ensure bond revenues are used appropriately, Serve as a conduit of information to the public, and Review bond program performance. This analysis serves to reflect our engagement with district leadership that represents the community's interests and voices, aligns with the District's strategic plan goals, and is in service to a comprehensive and equitable education for Centennial students.
